## Co-option of new councillor

Councillors welcomed Carli Burke onto the council at the September meeting. Carli lives on the Noverton Estate and, having lived previously in Bishops Cleeve, she has detailed knowledge of the parish and a keen interest in the local area.

## Meetings

Legislation continues to change and, whilst parish councils are exempt from the latest regulations which ban gatherings of more than 6 people, the National Association of Local Councils (NALC) advises that meetings should continue to be held virtually wherever possible. We have now held 5 meetings using the Zoom video conferencing platform and meetings continue to be attended by local residents. The meeting link is now published on the agenda. However, if there are any residents who do not have access to the internet or are not able to attend the virtual meetings for any other reason but would like items raised in the public forum, please do feel free to telephone the Clerk in advance of the meetings which continue to be held on the second Tuesday of each month.

## Website

Following the introduction of new regulations, the Southam Today website has been reviewed and updated to make it more accessible. It is hoped that all content will now be more accessible to those who, for example, navigate the website using just a keyboard or listen to content using a screen reader. An accessibility statement available at the bottom of each page of the website gives full details of the measures put in place.

## Planning Applications

At the August meeting it was noted that planning notices are not always clearly displayed by Tewkesbury Borough Council. Residents are not always aware that applications have been submitted and may therefore miss the opportunity to comment on applications which directly affect them. The Parish Council, as statutory consultee, is advised of all new planning applications in the parish. These will then be considered at the subsequent parish council meeting as long as this falls before the deadline for submission for comments. In future, details of all new applications will be notified to those on the email circulation list and published on a new website page. # The Church of the Ascension, Southam

Although the doors to the Church of the Ascension in Southam have remained closed for safety reasons during the Covid 19 crisis, the kindness and support of the **Cartwright** family has meant that services are being held in the Tithe Barn next door.



Although we are socially distancing, the quality of the sound in this huge hall is remarkable and we have particularly enjoyed listening to the recorded music as part of the prayer and reflection time at 10am on alternate Sunday mornings.

We have welcomed about 25 people at each of the two services held so far, and further services led by Richard our vicar, are planned for the 27<sup>th</sup> September and the 11<sup>th</sup> October.



The Tithe Barn and the attached shelter shed date from the late 14<sup>th</sup> and early 15<sup>th</sup> centuries. Such barns were constructed near to churches to store the one tenth share of produce which farmers had to contribute each year to support the clergy.

Times have certainly changed but, may we ask you to consider making a donation of tinned produce or toiletries for our Harvest Festival on 11<sup>th</sup> October. 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# Southam Village Hall

October-November 2020

## AGM report:



For the first time the Village Hall Management Committee AGM was held virtually via ZOOM on Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> August 2020. A rearrangement from the originally scheduled 21<sup>st</sup> April 2020. The meeting was open to registered parishioners.

The Chair thanked the Committee and Volunteers who had helped run the Village Hall over the year. A special thank you to those who helped with the Gold Cup Café and Car Park which is still our biggest fund raiser.

Over the past year the hall had been used for many village events including our regular Pub Nights and Film Nights. We held a summer BBQ, presented a Rugby World Cup Final screening and held a quiz night. Children were entertained by the kids Christmas party and the Christmas light switch on. The hall remained popular with our regular bookers, most of whose activities are open to the local community (Keep Fit, Pilates, U3A Table Tennis, Bridge, WI, Art Group, Church breakfasts and Drop In).

On a financial front our letting income was 20% down on last year. Roughly 4% of this arises from forced closing for the last 2 weeks of the year due to the COVID 19 pandemic. Our one-off letting income was down 38% on the year due mostly to the committee discouraging non-Southam residents parties as these are the source of most of the problems with the community and the hirers.

## Management Committee Changes:

We were sorry to report that Sal Nurden had decided to step down as Vice-Chair. Sal was a very valuable member of our Committee looking after the day to day running issues and was the focal point of Gold Cup Café.

At a committee meeting immediately following the AGM Kevin Wilcox and Susanna Tyrell were co-opted on to the Committee.

## Hall Fabric and Maintenance:

The committee have been considering the development of the hall to include enhanced stage facilities with increased changing rooms/storage space and provision of a separate bar. Meeting with Tewkesbury Borough Council Planning officers, it was discovered that in their view previous extensions to the hall had already used all our 'growth' and we were not likely to be able to extend as planned. The committee is now considering alternatives with a smaller footprint change. An outside tap and LED lights to light the bin area have been fitted.

## Parishioners Questions and Comments:

A question was raised regarding the potential of the hall donating land for the installation of playground facilities for children in the 3-7 age group within the Village Hall grounds. The current committee are unable to support the proposal.

The concerns are: -

The hall is hired out including use of the grounds. There is a risk of conflict between hall and playground users.

The committee are committed to the good relations with our neighbours. As the Play facility would be outside the committee's control it was felt the possible noise could create problems, we were not able to curtail.

Funding, maintenance and insurance costs could not be afforded by the Hall.

It was pointed out that Southam Parish Council are already responsible for a play area within the parish in the Noverton housing estate which is available for village residents.

A question was raised whether there was a risk we may lose some of our regular hirers?

Currently we have more requests to hire the hall than ever due to the lack of open facilities like the Hall. The committee is adhering to strict guidelines issued by Gloucestershire Rural Community Council (GRCC) through ACRE (Action with Communities in Rural England), in respect of risk assessments and protocols that need to be in place before the hall can be re-opened.

## COVID Update:

Following our forced closure in March, the committee had planned to open the hall from the end September 2020. Due to the recent update of Government Guidelines on the Rule of 6, the Committee has decided to delay reopening until we have assessed the new guidance from ACRE. Throughout the Pandemic the Committee has continued meeting monthly and regularly pop in to check the hall.

I think everyone will agree the hall grounds are kept tidy by our gardener. Thank you also to our committee members and volunteers for supporting our 'community building' the village hall.

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## A look back to the April 1997 Newsletter...

### SOUTHAM LINKS

Last month's Links puzzle invited readers to identify the Southam location linked by: an aviation pioneer; the Grand Annual Steeplechase, and Arthur Yiend. The links were perhaps a little obtuse, and required some lateral thinking to find the connection between flying, horse racing and building. Let's look at each a little more closely.

**Aviation** This part of Gloucestershire has several links with the early days of aviation. Sir Frederick Handley-Page was born in Cheltenham, as was Marshal of the Royal Air Force Sir Arthur "Bomber" Harris. Closer to Southam, Stoke Orchard was the home of Amy Johnson in the 1930s. However, perhaps the more famous of aviation pioneers to visit the area regularly was Sir Alan Cobham with his air display or "Flying Circus". But Cobham was not alone in bringing the excitement of the early days of flying to the county. In April 1931 the Berkshire Aviation Company ran Cheltenham Air Week under the direction of Captain FJW Holmes, another well-known pioneer of aviation whose famous flying circus featured wing-walking and inverted flying.

**Horse Racing** Long before horse racing settled at Prestbury Park, the Parish of Southam had played host to the Sport of Kings. The excellent turf on Cleeve Common made it an obvious venue, and the first races were held in 1818. By the 1820s the course was blessed with a Grandstand and crowds estimated at 50,000 attended the meetings. Thoroughbred Racing on Cleeve Hill declined around the middle of the 19th Century and was replaced in popularity by spring meetings for hunting horses. At one time the Cheltenham Grand Annual Steeplechase was second only to the Liverpool Grand National. The Cheltenham race was run over a variety of courses including Andoversford, Bibury and the lower slopes of Cleeve Hill.

**Building** Arthur Yiend was a builder active in this area around the turn of the century. He and his brother George rented the rights to most of the quarries on Cleeve Hill, supplying stone for local housing as well as buildings further afield such as Cheltenham Ladies' College, Magdalen College and for repairs to Tewkesbury Abbey.

**The Link** Arthur Yiend built Gotherington and Bishop's Cleeve railway stations for the railway linking Cheltenham to Winchcombe and beyond. The line of the railway followed the boundary of Kayte Farm, which was also the venue for the running of the Cheltenham Grand Steeplechase in the 1860s, and for Cheltenham Air Week in April 1931.

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### **C H U R C H S E R V I C E S S U S P E N D E D**

The **Archbishops of Canterbury and York** have asked that church services are suspended for the time being. Accordingly, services at the **Church of the Ascension** in **Southam** will not take place until further notice.
